than wearing a crown...*

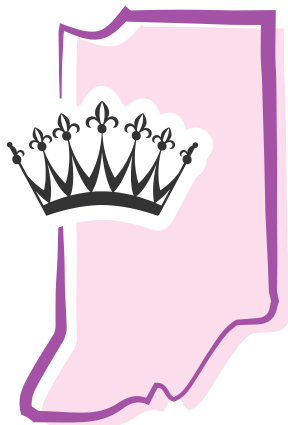
